1. Course Objectives

The main objective of this course is to introduce the fundamental topics in Microeconomic Theory. Consumer and production theory are the two main blocks analyzed. Special attention will also be paid to government intervention (with a particular emphasis on the U.S. experience).

The exposition will be as rigorous as possible even at the Principles level of this course. Some basic analytical tools will be extensively employed. In particular, the use of graphs will be emphasized throughout the course and a brief review of the implied techniques will be given in class.
