Aim of the Course:

Economic issues are a recurring source of litigation, and the media regularly report legal battles. Our judicial system has incorporated many economic expressions in legal decisions. This course introduces students to recent applications of economic analysis to important areas where legal and economic concerns interface and considers their public policy implications. The performance and efficiency of legal institutions will be evaluated and issues in the common law fields of property, torts, and contract law will be featured.

Presentation of the Course:

The course will be a combination of lectures and discussion. Students will have opportunity to express their ideas in oral presentations, written papers, and class discussions. Dates and topics for oral presentations will be determined at the first class meeting. Students are expected to attend <u>all</u> classes and to participate in class discussions.

Two hour-tests will be given on October 8 and November 5th. A final examination is scheduled for Monday, December 15, at 9 a.m. These tests aim to discover the degree of student mastery of the factual knowledge and intellectual tools used by economists. Questions will focus on key topics and cases discussed in lectures, text, and class discussions. Students will write a brief paper [5 pages, double-spaced] analyzing a legal case relevant to a topic considered in the course. This paper is due on December 3. Factors entering into the determination of paper grades include quality of analysis, documentation, effectiveness of writing style, and, of course, grammar, spelling, and punctuation.
