## Scope of the Course

This course will survey the history of economic thought from the ancient Greeks through the modern period. The emphasis of the course will be on classical and neo-classical economics from Adam Smith through John Maynard Keynes and the neo-classical synthesis of Paul Samuelson. Attention will also be given to contemporary developments.

## Reserve Reading:

Required reading, not distributed in class, will be available at the reserve desk in O'Neill.

#### Note Well:

The Dean of A&S has reminded faculty that class attendance is required, and may be taken into account in grading. According to the academic regulations published in the A&S Catalogue students are expected to attend class regularly, take tests and submit papers and other works at the times specified in the course syllabus. Sudent who are absent on the day of a previously announced test are not entitled, as a matter of right, to make up what was missed, and professors may include as part of the semester's grades, marks for the quality and quantity of students' participation in class.

#### Grading and Examinations:

There will be two hour long examinations during the course of the semester, a written paper, and a comprehensive final during the examination period. Each of the hour examinations and the paper will count for 20 percent of the final grade, and the final examination will count for 30 percent. The quality and quantity of students' class participation will account for the remaining 10 percent. Dates for the hour examinations and the final examination are given below. Students should plan to be present on scheduled examination dates. Make-up examinations will not be given except at the request of the Dean, and only when the absence is for serious reason. Students are responsible for the assigned readings, and should prepare for class by doing it currently. Students should raise questions about the assigned reading which should be done in advance of class meetings.

### Written Paper:

A paper of 8-10 pages will be due November 20. The topic must be agreed to by the student and professor no later than September 25. Papers must be carefully organized and written, and should be proof read before being turned in. Pay careful attention to grammar and spelling. Acknowledge all sources of facts and ideas, and be careful in citing the work of others. Plagiarism is seriously dishonest and should be thoroughly shunned.
